



(1) Co-Create Justice






(2) Prioritize Community-Based Solutions

Invite justice partners, decision makers, community members, and impacted individuals into the process to assist in resolving conflicts.

(3) Promote Accountability



(4) Advance Equity



Community justice programs are committed to equity and combating racism, seeking to end the justice system's disproportionate impact on people of color by emphasizing community investment, prevention, "upstream" diversion, and policies and practices that eliminate or reduce collateral consequences of conviction.

(5) Put People First

Community justice programs are successful because they empower their community to lead healthy, fulfilled lives and promote community safety, resiliency, and well-being.

(6) Model Innovation

Community courts stay on the cutting edge of justice system reform by pioneering new ideas that make the system more equitable, accessible, transparent, collaborative, and restorative.

What is a community court?

Community courts are neighborhood or issue focused court programs that combine the power of the community and the justice system to address local problems through community-based services and solutions.

Community Engagement

We seek to uplift innovations in community engagement to assist court systems and stakeholders to more meaningfully and effectively partner with the communities they serve.



Procedural Justice



We seek to ensure that the justice system treats everybody with dignity and respect—thereby engendering trust—by providing guidance on incorporating voice, respect, understanding, and neutrality in all system interactions.

Community Service





We seek to move away from traditional labor models of community service and toward restorative models that include community engagement, civic education, and personal growth.




Risk-Need-Responsivity

We provide guidance on building accountability into programs that are grounded in evidence-based practices, person centered, restorative, community-based, and address criminogenic risk factors.
